
EYFS Welcome & Reading Meeting Oct 2019





Speaking and Listening

- Speaking and listening are vital skills children need to develop in order to live successful lives in society.
- They are key skills for children developing their ability to read and write.



What you can do

- Talk to them!
- Model and expect good listening.
- Encourage the understanding and use of new vocabulary.
- Sing songs, rhymes and read poems, enjoying the rhyme and rhythm of words.
- Read to your child regularly and develop their story language.



Reading at home

- Bug Club
- Quiet place for reading
- Playing reading games
- Let them see you reading
- Follow your child's lead
- Enjoyable shared experience!



Early Reading

- Picture Books...the purpose of these...
 - Encourage children to look at the pictures and talk about what they see
 - To understand the sequence of events in books
 - To hold a book and turn the pages
- Lilac/Pink Level...early reading skills/ book language
- Warming up a book
- Encourage discussion throughout
- Use of picture clues
 - There will be words that they can't read that is ok!
- Pointing to the text as you read
- Repetition
- Reinforce left to right, top to bottom
- Small print for adult to model and read encourage them to join in when ready.

Reading Folders



- Your child will read individually each week with an adult
- We will write in their yellow reading diaries when we have read with them
- Please re-read this story with them to reinforce learning at school
- We can change your child's book everyday and we encourage you to aim to read daily.
- When you have read with your child please write the title and date in their diary and sign/write a comment so we know you need a new book.
- Place their reading folder in the box outside their class in the morningthank you!

- Jolly Phonics






- •All about tuning into sounds musical, environmental, voice and body
- Aural discrimination of sounds, including letter sounds -sound talking.
- Rhyme and Alliteration



- Learning specific letters and sounds
- Reading tricky words:
 - I go no to the
- Blending and segmenting vc and cvc words, and in captions and sentences

How does it sound?

- No -uh unless it's 'u'! No Shwaring!
- Think about your mouth

- All other sounds are taught
- Alphabet names are important to describe the sounds made by more than one letter e.g. ch, ai
- More tricky words for reading
- Writing I go no to the
- Blending, segmenting, reading, writing words, captions and sentences



- Adjacent consonants introduced
- (for example nt, mp, dr, sp, cl)
- C= consonant V= vowel
- cvcc words ten-t mil-k jum-p
- ccvc words d-rum p-lop
 - s-poon
- ccvcc words s-lin-k




A New Vocabulary!


- Phonics the learning of letters and sounds
- Phoneme the sound a letter makes
- Grapheme the written letter
- Blending running sounds together to make a word
- Segmenting breaking a word up into its component sounds
- Tricky words words that cannot be decoded using phonics
- cvc c = consonant (b/c/d/f), v = vowel (a/e/ee)
- Digraph a sound made with two letters eg. sh ai oi
- Phonetically plausible written phonetically that it can still be read although it is spelt incorrectly eg. torl, werk

A final note!

- Please, please read with your child as much as possible and make it a special, enjoyable experience.
- Make time for bedtime stories!
- Visit the library
- Encourage audio books
- Retell favourites again and again
- Make up stories
- Let them role play to their hearts delight!
